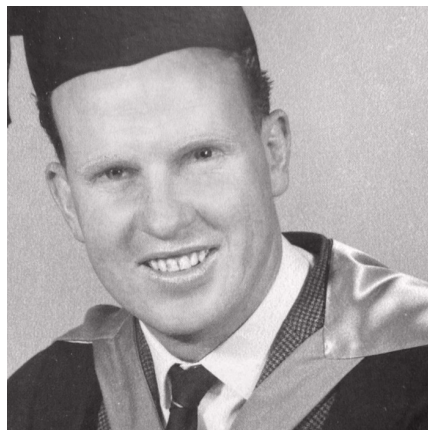
IN MEMORIAM



Derek COCKBURN

May 6, 2024 , aged 87

Derek's association with our club began in 1954, and he remained an active member for over 30 years. While a committed player, Derek's true passion lay in administration and development of schoolboy cricket. From the 1959-60 season, he managed teams and was a regular presence at Ilam Fields and Burnside Park. His contributions were pivotal in our club's growth, earning him life membership in 1984 and multiple cricket awards for his all-round dedication. Derek was a significant figure in the Christchurch Junior Cricket Association (CJCA), serving as President and later as Patron. His involvement with the South Island Primary Schools Tournament from 1963 to 2020 was legendary. Derek received the Sir Jack Newman Trophy for services to NZ Cricket in 2007 and the ICC Centenary Medal for volunteering in 2009. His legacy of dedication, innovation, and passion for cricket will be fondly remembered and deeply missed.



Brian McRorie

December 18, 2023 , aged 85

Brian McRorie was educated at St Bede's College and university, was also a dedicated cricketer with Marist Cricket Club, playing as a slow right-arm off-spinner. Beyond playing, he left a significant mark in sports administration, serving as club treasurer and auditor for various clubs, including Burnside West Christchurch University Cricket Club for decades. Brian's contributions extended to the Canterbury Cricket Association, where he served on the Management Committee and later the Board of Control, playing key roles on various sub-committees. His dedication earned him the title of Honorary Member of the Association in 1997. Brian's meticulous work and passion for sports, including rugby and horse racing, have left an enduring legacy in our community.



Bentley Seeto

July 25, 2024 , aged 59

Most members knew Bentley as father of our premier men's player Tim Seeto, but he was also a member of the 'Cricket Dads' who are a group of fathers who had their children come up through junior cricket, all from difference cricket clubs, and were brought together as their sons represented Christchurch as part of the 2018 CJCA South Island Tournament. Bentley passed peacefully at Nurse Maude Hospice on 25th July 2024, surrounded by his family.

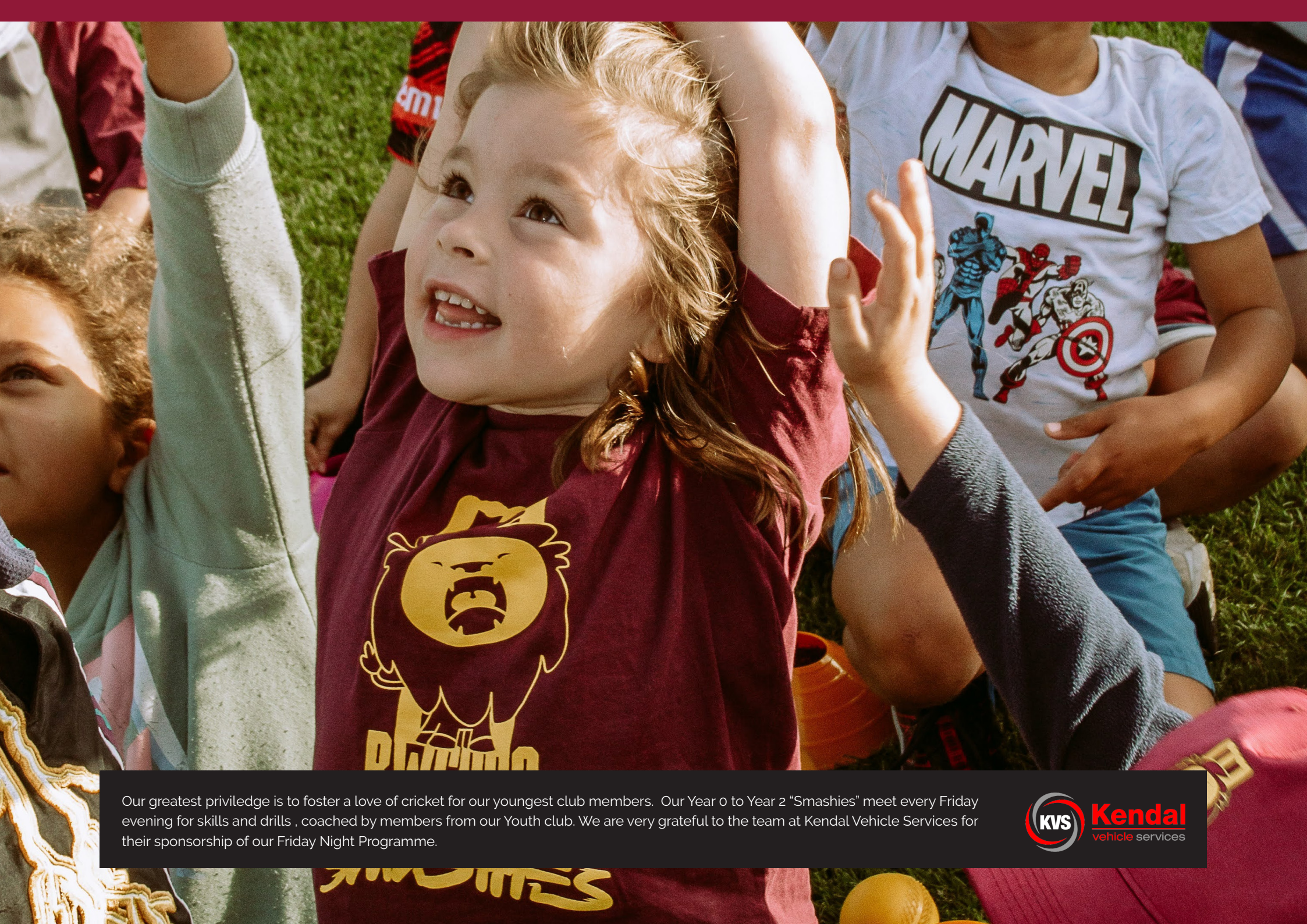

FROM THE CHAIRMAN'S DESK

Deep in the winter of 2022, the committee underwent a strategic planning process, with the goal of establishing the strategic direction of the club for the next five years. Braving cold evenings and huddled around tables and flipcharts in the club pavilion, ideas formed and debate ensued. We emerged with a plan, centred around the simple belief that our club is delivering "More than Cricket", and we wanted to have a positive impact on our community and in our members lives.

Our vision continues to resonate in 2024, particularly through these tough economic times. Afterall, nothing beats spending time with your mates (even after a tough day in the field).

From a cricketing standpoint from our junior through to our senior men's and women's teams we have tasted success. Success can be measured in many ways; player numbers, developing new skills or winning games and titles, or simply having fun with your friends. The Premier men's side retained the Two day trophy - after winning the One day cup earlier in the summer- to complete the double for only the second time in our club's history. The Champion's men side won the T20 title, and were close runners up in their Two Day Trophy, and our Social 8's ladies tasted success, by winning their grade for the first time in their team's short history.

On the representative scene Will O'Rourke joined Tom Latham in the NZ team, Will and Mitch Hay toured Australia with NZ 'A,' Oscar Jackson captained NZ at the Under 19 World Cup in South Africa, and Chris Kennedy was in the NZ over 60 team playing in the world cup in India. On top of this we have had excellent representation at Canterbury level in the senior sides and underage sides for both men's and women's sides. The club is immensely proud of everyone's achievements.

The tough economic times impacts directly on our club, as we have noticed an increase in "Declined, insufficient funds" responses to our funding applications. This makes balancing the books that much harder, so achieving a break even situation is a satisfactory result. I want to extend a huge 'Thanks' to our business

partners and other donors for their on-going financial support. On a positive note in this area, Matthew Everest is stepping into the Partnerships & Marketing on the committee role on the committee, and part of the plan is to re-energise and re-engage with past players and supporters in more formal ways.

One of the club's Strategic Pillars is our facilities. Draft plans of our clubrooms upgrade have been circulated for comment and discussions have been held with FC2011 (who retain partial ownership of the downstairs area of our pavilion). The club is in good spirit with wonderful members and supporters. I would like to thank and acknowledge the committee's, players, parent helpers, coaches, team managers and supporters for all you do to make BWCUCC such a special club.

OUR CLUB'S STRATEGIC PLAN

When the strategic plan was drafted in the winter of 2022, we identified establishing a stable governance structure, and a sustainable financial operating model as our two biggest challenges. These became the first two of what would become our "strategic pillars". Two years on, the same challenges remain, but it is clear that progress is being made in both areas.

We know that to maintain our standing as a leading cricket club in Christchurch and New Zealand, we need to keep rising to challenges and to look for ways to focus on the areas that have the most impact on our success and sustainability. The committee looked at their respective areas of responsibility and identified a total of six strategic pillars in 2022, as well as identifying our overarching vision, mission, and values as a club.

From 2024-2027, we will focus of ways to measure ourselves against strengthening our pillars: Stable Club Governance, Strong Community Connection, Financial Viability, Enhanced Cricket Pathways, Improved Facilities, and Membership Attraction & Retention.

OUR VISION, OUR MISSION

Our vision "More than Cricket" means our club is about more than just being a place to turn up at on the weekend to bowl a few overs, paddle a few boundaries, and then head home again.

We are, first and foremost, a cricket club, but we are also a place to forge friendships, a place to engage and connect with schools, communities and cultures of local residents.

We want to be the best community cricket club in New Zealand, and to have a positive impact on our community's lives through cricket. We will thrive as a club by focussing on delivering our strategic pillars, and living our core values.

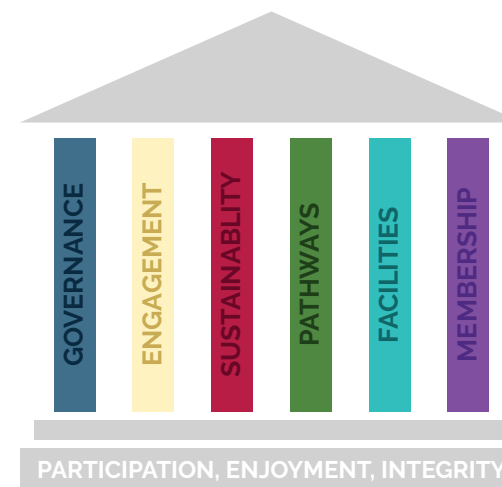
CORE VALUES

STRATEGIC PILLARS

Our strategic pillars place an emphasis on sustainable growth, and place cricket, our members, and our community firmly at the centre of our decisions.

CLUB GOVERNANCE

We will achieve our club's vision with the right organisational and governance structures in place. Our leadership model must be robust and have high-quality administration and succession planning in every role. We will invest in the development of our committee to ensure we have the right skills, networks, and diversity in membership to enable BWCUCC to achieve our goals. Organisational risk will be mitigated through having the right policies, procedures and plans in place.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

By knowing who our stakeholders are (including our members, supporters, partners, and the wider community) and understanding their needs, we can better deliver to their requirements. With effective outreach, all existing and potential new stakeholders will know our value proposition and be more willing to partner with us. A constructive and focused partnership strategy will lead to new opportunities, better financial efficiencies, and the delivery of higher-quality cricket programmes.

FINANCIAL SUSTAINABILITY

Financial sustainability will be realised through adequate knowledge of potential income streams, and by reducing dependence on charitable donations. Strategic relations and evidenced-based forecasting will also contribute to the financial sustainability of our club. BWCUCC will implement financial systems and put people into roles that are focused on reducing costs and increasing income. Income streams will include increasing the use and utility of our facilities, as well as delivery of diversified services and cricket formats for our members.

CRICKET PATHWAYS

We will provide high-quality cricket and community sport-related pathways for our members (encompassing playing, coaching, administrative, and governance pathways). We will document our pathways to ensure they are transparent and equitable for all club members. Our pathways will be developed with the goals of providing a safe and positive environment and the opportunities for our members to fulfill their greatest potential. We will develop and align our pathways by partnering and engaging with external stakeholders and governing bodies.

CLUB BUILDINGS & FACILITIES

BWCUCC will develop and execute a facilities plan which caters to our needs, priorities, and balances our financial responsibilities. Our facilities will become a significant revenue contributor. The emphasis for our facilities plan will be to deliver safe, fit-for-purpose facilities that meet the needs of our members and community. Financially and culturally, the return on investment in our facilities will be maximised through being utilised by a variety of community groups. Our plans will deliver equity for our members.

MEMBERSHIP RETENTION

When we know our value to the community, we can work on the projects will help us to attract and retain more members. We will continue to solicit the input of our members and community to develop plans for our facilities and cricketing offerings. We will continue to promote our story through a range of channels to attract new members and stay engaged with our community. We will foster a culture that supports our volunteers, with particular emphasis on inclusion, manaakitanga, diversity, and equity.

CLUB GOVERNANCE

The executive committee is charged with setting the strategy, direction and policies for BWCUC, and is ultimately responsible for the governance of the club.

Officers of the Club

BWCUC has four Officers of the club: The chairman, treasurer, secretary, and patron who represent BWCUC and the club at CMCA events and meetings. The chairman is also official delegate at CMCA Meetings. These positions are elected annually at Annual General Meetings.

Patron

Through the history of the club an honored senior member of the club has held the role of patron. Grant Dickson (#394) is a former member of the double-crown winning Premier side of 1990, BWCUC Premier Centurion (125 Premier appearances), and still turns out regularly in President's grade as a classical top order batsman and occasional off-spin bowler. He has held the Office of Club Patron since 2015.

Executive Committee

Executive Committee members are elected at the club's Annual General Meeting, and vacancies that may arise during the year are filled by vote of the committee at our monthly committee meetings. The chairman, treasurer, and secretary are ex-officio committee members.

Burnside West-Christchurch University Cricket Club provides cricket opportunities for all ages, genders, and abilities—from social to competitive—by delivering age and stage appropriate player pathways aligned to New Zealand Cricket's 'Pathway to Performance' programme.



North West Women's Cricket is a subsidiary of BWCUC, and was established in 2019 in an effort to develop the game and provide a more inclusive environment for female junior youth, and senior cricketers.



Our Youth programme—North West Youth Cricket (NWYC), is a partnership with Merivale Papanui Cricket Club, with a framework that includes sharing training facilities, resources, and governance. NWYC provides encouragement for high-school aged members from both clubs to stay in the sport as many schools in the North West zone do not deliver competitive Secondary School cricket. This close affiliation to BWCUC and MPCC also provides a pathway back to Senior cricket for those members when they graduate high school.

TEAMS AND PARTICIPATION

In 2023/24, our club (including all Burnside West Christchurch University senior and junior members, North West Women's Junior, Youth, and Senior members, and North West Youth Boy's members) totaled nearly 540 playing members. We delivered cricket across a range of CMCA and CJCA interclub organisations, as well as grass-roots Smash Play and Kiwi cricket for our youngest members in a non-competitive skill builder format. Every Saturday, there were up to forty teams playing across a range of social and competitive cricket grades representing our club - all strongly supported from the sidelines by parents and loyal supporters and volunteers - scoring, umpiring, or managing teams.

MEN'S CRICKET

BWCUC provides social, semi-competitive, and competitive club cricket to all ages, and is committed to providing pathways into Men's cricket for school leavers, as well as pathways to elite cricket for players wanting to make a career from our sport. We have a proud track record of success at all levels in the Christchurch Metropolitan Cricket Association competitions, and a large number of members who have gone on to play representative and international level.

It has been a huge honour to be the Club Captain for the last several seasons. As I step down from the role, I am proud to reflect on the success that the club has seen in 2023/24. I am very grateful to Adam Winter for agreeing to step in as my replacement, and I wish him all the best. I also want to extend my thanks to all the players, volunteers, and supporters for helping me during my time as club captain.

I am pleased to report that our club has had another outstanding Men's cricket season. Our morning grade sides performed exceptionally well, with the Premiership team winning both the one-day and two-day competitions, and the Championship Men winning the T20 competition and coming within a point of taking our their Two Day Trophy.

In the afternoon 'social' grades, we again fielded three social T20 sides in the Cavaliers competition - the Duck Duck Sixes, the Bushwhackers, and the Sticky Wickets in their debut season. I hope that we see these teams back again next summer, and that they continue to integrate into club life.

In the 40 over formats, the club has four sides. We entered two sides in the Masters grade, with the Robbie's getting the rub over the Foxes in their competitions. Masters is a competitive competition, despite the minimum age of 35 years - with many high-quality former Premiership and even former First Class players in the grade. It is sought after, as seen in the number of teams entered in the competition - at 15 sides, it is second only to the Cavaliers T20 grades in terms of popularity.

For them, Ben McGarvey dominated with both bat and ball, earning himself the Robertson MVP Cup for the best afternoon grade player at the club.

I want to thank the coordinators of the Division 4 and 5 sides (Adam Flynn and Dhanuja Delapologe) for their flexibility with providing players into the morning grade teams when the club needed—especially over the Christmas holiday, and through the demands of the University exam periods

In total we had twenty one senior players make higher-honours teams this season. The highlight was Will O'Rourke, who represented Canterbury, New Zealand A, and eventually made his debut for the Black Caps in all three formats. He was rewarded with wickets, and a prized NZ Contract for the upcoming season. Chris Kennedy toured with the New Zealand side to the Over 60 World Cup in India - proving to us all that you are never too old to achieve your cricket dreams, At the other end of the age scale, Oscar Jackson was the captain for the New Zealand Under 19 World Cup (as well as making the Wellington A side).

Many other players were involved at various representative and age-group levels, showing that our pathways are strong.

I look forward to continuing to contribute to the club's success, and supporting Adam in 2024/25.

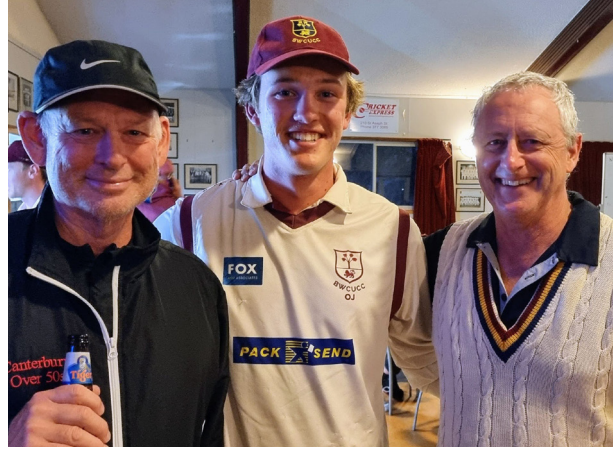

PLAYHQ REGISTRATION, E-SCORING, & STATISTICS

Player Registration

In 2022, NZC adopted the PlayHQ electronic player registration and match scoring system. This NZ wide platform was used for player registrations for all community cricket - junior, youth, and senior - all over New Zealand.

The PlayHQ platform was originally developed as a registration database and scoring platform in Australia for other sports (including field hockey), and at the time of release, the cricket-specific capabilities of the platform were quite under-developed. However since 2022, significant gains have been made, making PlayHQ a reliable scoring platform on game-days. Despite technology drawbacks compared to the prior CricHQ system, and simplicity shortcomings compared to traditional pen and paper, the PlayHQ platform is slowly gaining popularity.

PlayHQ was adequate as a registration platform, enabling online payment and relatively simple setup. All playing members were required to use the platform in order to have their names available for selection in team lists for electronic scoring.

In total, the club (across BWC, NWW, and NXY) membership included 538 active members for the 2023/24 summer (including players, coaches, and managers).

E-Scoring

The PlayHQ platform supports live scoring in a web browser, with similar features to the app-based platform that it replaced (CricHQ).

In 2023/24 the majority of morning grade matches were live scored allowing club members and supported to follow-on live on their phones, from around the city or the world. It is hoped that in 2024/25 that improvements to the platform will make it easier still.

There are plans at the club to invest in a video-streaming platform to allow Premiership fixtures to be live streamed over the internet if suitable funding can be found.

Team & Individual Statistics

The mixed use of electronic and paper score books, especially in afternoon grades, led to inconsistent statistics across some grades. This is a real shame as one of the beauties of club cricket is the ability to search back through fixtures, scorecards, and statistics to reminisce on seasons past.

Officially, individual and grade statistics are available for all club members at the NZC links below, however, it has been pointed out that many records are inaccurate or unreliable. Unfortunately this issue which was raised last year is still not fully addressed.

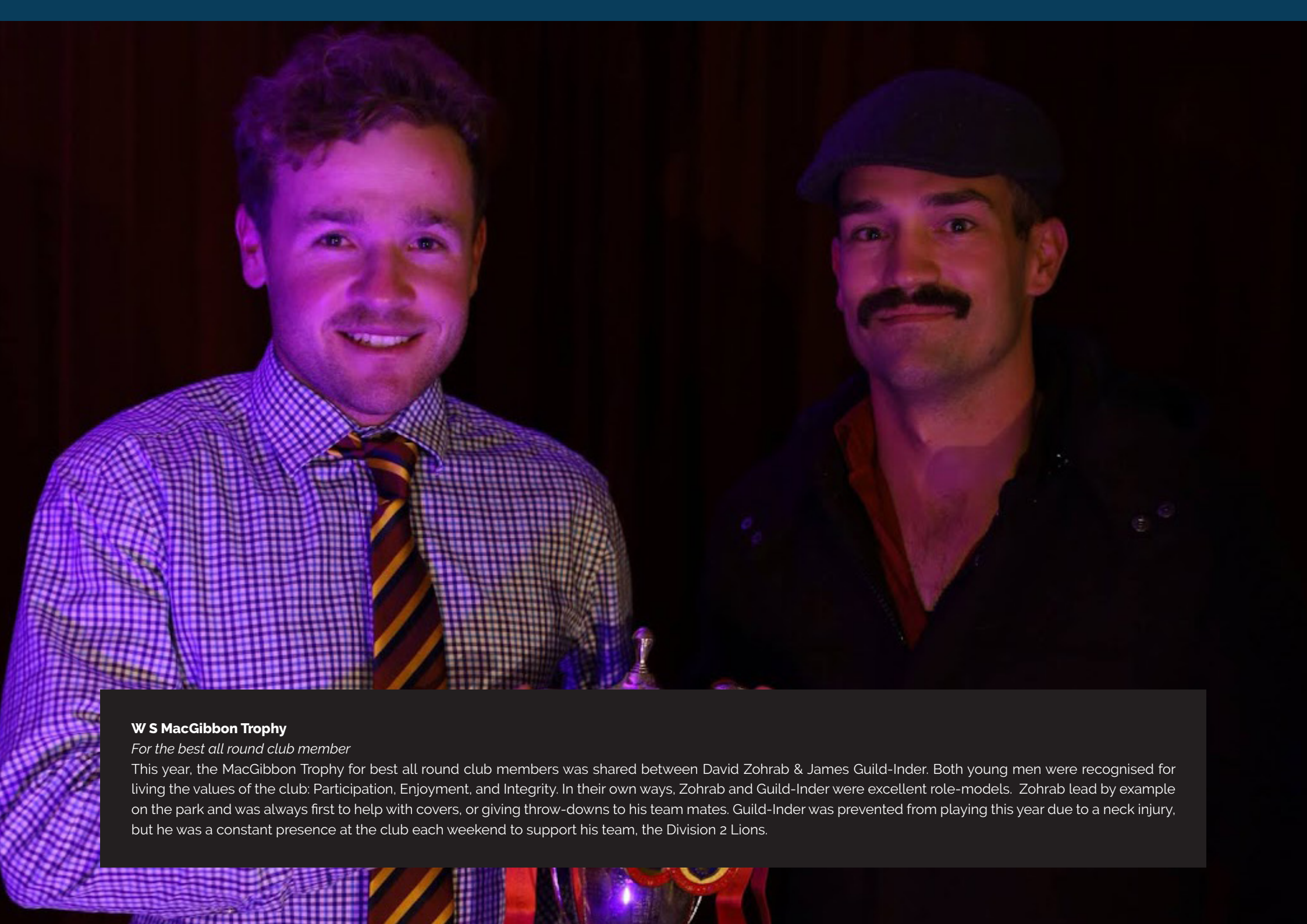

PREMIERSHIP MEN'S TEAM REPORT

A season to remember

The 2023/2024 season will be remembered fondly for years to come, as the Premier side won the One-Day and Two-Day double for the first time in 30 years.

Pre-Christmas Two-Day Campaign

The Two-Day campaign started strong with four outright wins. In the first round, BWCUCUCC defeated St Albans by 180 runs in a shortened one-innings game. Openers Henry Christie and Thomas Zohrab both made 50s before spinners Matt Hay and Ethan O'Donoghue took seven wickets between them, dismissing St Albans for 72.

In the second round, BWCUCUCC was bowled out for 46 in the first innings and conceded 120 in OBC's reply. However, a valiant batting effort saw them make 169 in tough conditions, leaving OBC 96 to win. An exceptional bowling performance from Alex Tait and Rohan Thompson, who each took five wickets, bowled OBC out for 26.

Round three saw another challenging start with a 95-run first innings deficit. Chasing 272 to win in 50 overs, David Zohrab led the bowling effort with six wickets in the second innings. Captain Matt Hay (130*) and Scott Janett (60*) then forged an unbroken 190-run partnership to secure the win.

In the final round before the white ball portion of the season, BWCUCUCC set 220 and bowled Merivale Papanui out for 102 and 104 in both innings to claim an innings victory, with David Zohrab taking five wickets.

T20 Competition

The white ball campaign began with the T20 format, in a new high-stakes pool format which meant that we had to be "on" from ball one. Unfortunately the weather interrupted proceedings, and our three scheduled pool games were reduced to two must-win encounters. A win over East Shirley in game one, and a loss to OBC in game two meant that we didn't have enough points to progress.

One-Dayers

The One-Day campaign began with a win over Sydenham, fresh off their T20 championship victory. Scott Janett scored his maiden Premier century, and Will O'Brien took three early wickets. Despite a strong partnership from Sydenham, Jackson Latham took three late wickets to bowl us to a win by eight runs.

In round two, BWCUCUCC lost to Lancaster Park, falling short of a modest 190 despite Mitchell Hay's 94 not out. The third round saw a big win over Merivale Papanui, with BWCUCUCC setting 247 and bowling them out for 138.

Against East Shirley in round four we set a target of 278, an innings built around Nick Gibb's incredible 151 not out. Fast starts from Tait and O'Brien had Easts reeling, and they were bowled out for 187. In round five at Heathcote, despite impressive scores from Carl Huyser (81) and David Zohrab (109 not out), Heathcote chased down 322 in 39 overs.

In round six, BWCUCUCC defeated Saints with Scott Janett's 86 and strong support from Hay, Christie, and Huyser. A dominant bowling display led to a 100-run win. The final round against OBC needed to be won to secure a playoff spot. BWCUCUCC bowled OBC out for 189 and chased the target inside 25 overs, with Henry Christie scoring 88 not out off 64 balls.

In the semi-final against East Shirley, BWCUCUCC recovered from a nervous start to post 296, thanks to partnerships from Janett (50), Hay (66), and Oscar Jackson (105 off 79 balls). BWCUCUCC then bowled Easts out for 182, with Alex Tait leading the way with 3/15 off 8 overs.

In the final against Lancaster Park, Park scored 200 all out. BWCUCUCC was in trouble at 97/5 before Janett (83 not out) and Zohrab (43 not out) secured a five-wicket win.

Two-Day Competition Resumption

The Two-Day competition resumed with a round five clash against second-placed Lancaster Park. BWCUCC, at 40/5, was rescued by another Scott Janett masterclass of 124, taking them to 196 all out. Oscar Jackson took 5/25 to reduce LP to 136. Strong second innings performances from Gibb, Hay, and Janett set LP 280 to win in 60 overs. BWCUCC managed to take eight wickets, and the game ended in a draw.

In round six, East Shirley was bowled out for 135, with Matt Hay taking 4/11. Scott Janett made another century, giving BWCUCC a 100-run first innings lead. East Shirley was 30/4 at stumps on day one before being bowled out for 111, with Latham taking five wickets. BWCUCC chased the target before lunch, taking a large lead into the final round.

Round seven was delayed by rain, reducing the game to a 35-over first innings per side. Sydenham finished day one with a 40-run lead. BWCUCC battled hard in the second innings, with Nick Gibb leading the way with 71, setting Sydenham 232 in 50 overs to win. Sydenham chased the target with six wickets in hand, but the trophy was BWCUCC's.

The bowling was somewhat inconsistent, no doubt impacted by the lack of decent totals to defend, but the usual suspects led the way with wickets—the cultured Gibson (30) supported by Wheeler and Kember (20 each).

The return of Robertson to the Captain's role was less impactful than his movement from slip to mid-off, where his newfound dexterity dramatically increased his ratio of catches to opportunities - despite often moving like a drunk gazelle across the grass.

In the end the player of the season was the indefatigable Mike "Wheels" Wheeler, who consistently tested opposing teams with his bowling and frustrated them with his class & composure in the middle to lower order.

Debuts for club legend Brett Thomson and others offer hope for the new season, in what has become a strong Master's grade, and one that has no doubt benefitted from the increased interest generated by the emergence of veterans' representative opportunities across various age groups.

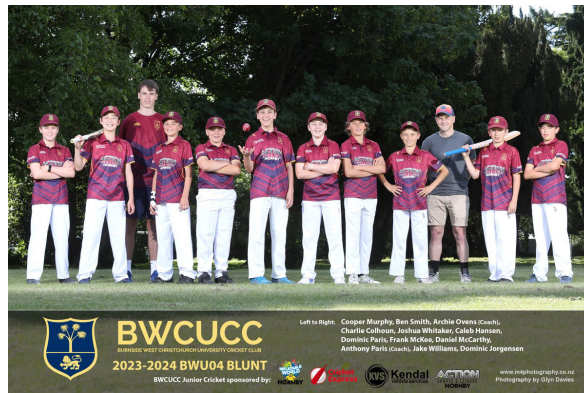

TREASURER'S REPORT

A small surplus of \$505 is being reported for the 2023/2024 financial year.

Income Sources:

Our primary sources of income include grants & funding 37%, sponsorship 4%, subscriptions 21%, bar sales 21% and various other income streams 17% with each of these sources playing a crucial role in sustaining our club's operations. The total income for the year is \$214k which is \$71k lower than the previous year. The decrease in income is largely due to a large reduction in available funds from funding providers (Gaming trusts) and also \$23k less received from players as there was no uniform rollout in the year (and also no costs).

I'd like to express much thanks to the efforts of Mike Roan who puts in a huge effort to prepare and submit applications for grant funding. He has been successful in developing relationships and achieving what funding is available. He continues to be ably assisted by Graeme Campbell and Gareth Gibson.

Sponsorship has reduced compared to the previous year. These contributions are invaluable in allowing us to invest in equipment, facilities, and player development.

Organizing fundraising events has proven effective in bolstering our finances with quiz nights and various functions throughout the season. These events not only provide financial support but also strengthen the sense of community within the club.

Expense Management:

In terms of expenses, our club has been diligent in managing costs to ensure the financial health of the organisation. Key expense categories include ground maintenance, equipment, coaching, bar supplies and various other operational costs. Total expenses for the year were \$214k.

Expenses are \$61k lower than the previous year which reflects both a tightening of spending and not incurring the costs of the new clothing rollout from the previous year. The club has grown in recent years with more teams and players than ever

before. This means more resources are required just to maintain existing facilities let alone providing for future development. Coaching, grounds and equipment in particular all are costing more than they have in the past.

Delivering a small surplus in a year with such tough economic conditions is a real achievement and I thank the efforts of the committee and the wider club for their discipline in keeping costs under control.

We extend our sincere gratitude to our sponsors, members, and supporters who have played a pivotal role in our financial stability. Your dedication and contributions are instrumental in our continued growth and success.

Thanks also to Vanessa Robertson who gives up so much of her time to keep the clubs accounts in order.

GEORGE JAMES HOWDEN ESTATE

George James Howden, a Life Member and long-time supporter of Burnside West-Christchurch University Cricket Club, died in 2007. In his Will he left the Club a generous bequest of \$20,000.

He also instructed Trustees Executors Ltd to set up a Deed of Arrangement to utilise the "residual" funds from his Estate, and invest them to provide a long-term income stream for our Club. The Estate was registered as a charitable entity by the Charities Commission on 30 June 2008.

The Club at all times needs to be aware that the initial bequest and all subsequent income generated under the Deed may only be utilised by the Club for the following purposes: (a) The provision of coaching services at all grades; (b) the maintenance, upkeep and improvement of the grounds upon which the Club's activities are centred or take place; (c) the provision of or improvement to the facilities and amenities of the Club, and (d) the general betterment of the Club as a whole, and the promotion of its interests.

To ensure the income is paid or applied in accordance with the terms of the Trust, it is a requirement that at all times there is an Advisory Committee of three persons who must give prior approval. Upon the death, retirement, resignation, or removal from the office of any Advisory Committee member, the remaining two members will appoint another suitable person to fill the vacancy. The Advisory Committee shall make such rules and regulations to govern its functioning as it may determine and any such rules or regulations may from time to time be revoked, amended, replaced or modified with the unanimous approval of all Advisory Committee Members.

The current Advisory Committee office holders are Grant Dickson, Paul O'Flaherty, and Christopher Kennedy. In conjunction with the Trustees Executors, they have continued the "conservative growth portfolio" strategy established by the original Advisory Committee and Trustee Executors. At each balance date, annual accounts are prepared by the Trustees Executors, and once approved by the Advisory Committee the net income shall be paid to the Club by Trustees Executors Ltd after setting aside an agreed percentage to add to the Trust Capital.

Thanks to the generosity of The Lion Foundation, the club was able to invest in a fit-for-purpose ride-on mower, which was put to heavy use all summer. Dave Robertson, is pictured putting the Husqvarna through its paces as he prepares the practise wickets for club training.
