IN MEMORIAM



Brian F. Hastings (#280), Life Member

October 7, 2024, aged 84

We are deeply saddened by the passing of Brian Hastings, a Life Member and one of our club's most distinguished international players. An elegant batsman, Brian played 31 Tests for New Zealand, scoring four centuries and co-holding a world-record 10th wicket partnership of 151 that stood for nearly 40 years.

A cornerstone of our premier side since the 1960s, Brian's commitment to the club was lifelong. Brian was a key architect of the merger and move to Burnside Park that shaped our modern club. He served on numerous committees, coached countless young players, and later became President of Canterbury Cricket and an ICC Match Referee.

A true gentleman of the game, Brian's legacy is in the national record books and the vibrant club he helped build. He will be sorely missed.



Brian Adams (#278) QSM, Life Member

July 22, 2025, aged 84

Brian Adams QSM, was a Life Member whose administrative contribution to Burnside West and Canterbury cricket was legendary. As Club Captain in the early 1970s, Brian was another key architect of the merger and move to Burnside Park that shaped our modern club.

He served in numerous committee roles, including President and selector, and was made a Life Member in 1980. His dedication to preserving our history was unparalleled; he authored the club's 75th and 100th-anniversary history books.

Recognised with a Queen's Service Medal and Life Membership of the Canterbury Cricket Association, Brian was an administrator of immense integrity whose tireless work benefited generations. We will always be grateful for his selfless contribution.



Reginald Hintz, Life Member

September 7, 2025, aged 94

Reginald (Reg) Hintz was beloved life member of the Burnside West Christchurch University Cricket Club, and a cornerstone of the club for over six decades. He joined the club in 1961 and dedicated a significant portion of his life to it, playing his entire cricket career in the President's grade. Reg served in numerous administrative capacities, including as a highly capable treasurer and as the club's President for two years. His leadership was instrumental in the club's success, as noted in his 1990-91 season report where he proudly highlighted the senior team's historic victories in the Trust Bank Trophy and Cup. Reg was nominated and became a life member of the club in 1992. His passion for cricket was a family affair. He took immense pride in his son Andrew's accomplishments as a talented bowler who played 45 matches for Canterbury. Hintz will be remembered for his unwavering dedication, his love for the game, and his invaluable contributions to the Burnside West Christchurch University Cricket Club.

IN MEMORIAM



Michael Phillips (#304)

August 22, 2025 , aged 90

Michael was a proud and passionate member of the club for many years, known for his competitive spirit on the field and his warm camaraderie off it. He was a key member of various senior teams including our Premier Men's side in the summer of 1966-1967, and was always willing to help, whether with scoring, organising social events, or offering a word of encouragement to a younger player. Michael's cheerful presence will be fondly remembered by all who shared a changing room with him.



Phoebe D'Arcy-Slade

January 11, 2025 , aged 19

It was with great shock and profound sadness that the club and the wider cricket community learned of the tragic passing of Phoebe D'Arcy Slade. A vibrant and talented young cricketer who came through the North West Women's Cricket pathway, Phoebe was a gifted wicket-keeper and a determined batter. She was a much-loved member of her teams, known for her infectious enthusiasm and positive attitude. Her loss is felt deeply by her friends and teammates.



David Trist (#309)

May 1, 2025 , aged 77

The NZ cricket community lost one of its great servants with the passing of David Trist, a former New Zealand Cricket Chairman and President whose life was dedicated to the game. While his administrative career took him to the highest levels, he never lost touch with the grassroots. David was a familiar and welcome face at club grounds across Christchurch, including Burnside Park, and always took a keen interest in the progress of our club. He played in our Premier men's side in a club playing career that spanned 1966 to 1979. His cricketing leadership and wisdom will be missed..

FROM THE CHAIR'S DESK



The 2024/25 summer will be remembered as one of the most successful in our club's history. On-field success was achieved across the board, headlined by the Premier Men's side securing a third consecutive two-day title while also winning the T20 competition. The NWWC Premier Women celebrated a historic season, winning their first 40-over competition, and further triumphs came from the Championship Men (Two-Day & T20 titles), the Division 2 Men (One-Day title), and the Duck Duck Six (Cavalier's T20 section winners). To top it off, the club was successful for the first time in the Chairman's Cup multi-grade knockout competition.

Our members were also well-recognised at the Christchurch Metro awards. Congratulations to Gareth Gibson (Peter Sharp Trophy for Administrator of the Year), Matthew Hay (Premier Player of the Year), and Henry Christie (U20 Batsman of the Year). Matthew, Alex Tait, and Jackson Latham were also deservedly named

in the CMCA Men's Premier Team of the Year. The accolades continued at a regional and national level, with the Premier Men winning the Sport Canterbury Orix Community Sports Team of the Year. We were also incredibly proud to see Darron Stackhouse receive the NZC Dulux Award for his outstanding contribution to coaching, and Chris and Erin Bond jointly acknowledged with a Community Award for their eight seasons of dedicated service to junior cricket.

Our player pathway continues to flourish. Tom Latham and Will O'Rourke are now established members of the Black Caps, and we were thrilled to see Mitchell Hay and Izzy Sharp make their international debuts this season. On the domestic scene, Scott Janett (Canterbury), Oscar Jackson (Wellington), and Hannah Ryan (Wellington) earned their first professional contracts, and a number of our players continue to be involved with Canterbury 'A' as well as over- and under- age graded Canterbury sides.

While we cherish and celebrate winning trophies and our players achieving at the highest level, the key is ensuring that all our members are having fun and enjoying their time with teammates. I take great joy in watching our junior teams on a Saturday morning and seeing the enthusiasm they have for the game. My sincere gratitude goes to all the junior coaches, managers, and supporters for creating such a positive and encouraging environment.

This season marked three years since North West Women's Cricket came fully under the governance of Burnside. While Merivale Papanui's decision to exit the original partnership was disappointing at the time, the full integration has been a significant positive, giving our female players a club they can truly call 'home'. The depth and quality of our players continues to grow, and it is rewarding to see both individual and team development each year.

The North West Youth Cricket partnership with Merivale Papanui, Burnside High School, and Papanui High School continues to provide valuable opportunities for boys to play competitive cricket where their schools may not have a programme. It is particularly pleasing to see Burnside High School investing in its cricket

facilities, and we look forward to training and matches being held at the school in the 2025/26 season.

Financially, like most sporting organisations, balancing the books annually remains a significant challenge. I am pleased to report that indications suggest we have achieved a small surplus this season. With subscriptions covering less than 20% of our operating costs, we remain heavily reliant on our business partners and grants from funding applications. I want to extend my sincere thanks to all our partners, suppliers, and community funders for their vital and ongoing support.

We are fortunate to be based at Burnside Park, with four high-quality grass blocks and training facilities that are excellently maintained by our ground staff, led by Dave Robertson. However, our clubrooms are showing their age and the changing facilities are no longer fit for purpose as we expand our investment into the growth of Youth and Women's cricket. Although draft refurbishment plans were completed in 2024, a lack of human and financial resources remains a barrier to meaningful progress. Over the winter, we joined early discussions with other park users about a potential centralised community complex, a concept we are generally supportive of exploring further.

I would like to thank all our volunteers for the time and commitment they give to the club. Your dedication and passion are the lifeblood of BWCUC. A special thanks must also go to the committee for all the work you do behind the scenes – it is greatly appreciated.

It is with great sadness that we acknowledge the passing of Brian Hastings in October 2024. Brian was one of our greatest players, forging a superb international and provincial career. More than that, he was a true club man, committed to the grassroots of the game. His contribution as a player, administrator, and visionary was immense, having been part of the group that moved the club to Burnside Park in 1972. A former Club Chair and Life Member, he was a true club legend.

In his passing, we also remember and honour fellow Life Member Brian Adams QSM, and former members Michael Phillips, and David Trist who passed away in the last year. And finally, it was a very big shock to everyone at the club in January to learn of the sudden passing of Phoebe D'Arcy Slade at the age of only 19. They are all deeply missed.

As we close the chapter on the past season, our focus now sharpens on the horizon of 2025/26. The upcoming season presents not only the familiar challenges of on-field competition but also a significant opportunity for renewal and strategic resetting off the field. Our commitment to fostering talent at all levels, from our junior programmes to our senior teams, remains the bedrock of our club's purpose.

This year also marks a pivotal moment in our club's history as we align with the new Incorporated Societies Act 2022. This legislative change has provided the impetus for a comprehensive review of our governance, which will culminate in the confirmation of a modernized club constitution at the AGM. These changes are designed to ensure our club operates with greater transparency and is robustly positioned for a successful future.

I look forward to seeing you all again this summer.

OUR CLUB'S STRATEGIC PLAN

When the strategic plan was drafted in the winter of 2022, we identified establishing a stable governance structure, and a sustainable financial operating model as our two biggest challenges. These became the first two of what would become our "strategic pillars". Two years on, the same challenges remain, but it is clear that progress is being made in both areas.

We know that to maintain our standing as a leading cricket club in Christchurch and New Zealand, we need to keep rising to challenges and to look for ways to focus on the areas that have the most impact on our success and sustainability. The committee looked at their respective areas of responsibility and identified a total of six strategic pillars in 2022, as well as identifying our overarching vision, mission, and values as a club.

From 2024-2027, we will focus on ways to measure ourselves against strengthening our pillars: Stable Club Governance, Strong Community Connection, Financial Viability, Enhanced Cricket Pathways, Improved Facilities, and Membership Attraction & Retention.

OUR VISION: MORE THAN CRICKET

"More than Cricket" means our club is about more than just being a place to turn up at on the weekend to bowl a few overs, paddle a few boundaries, and then head home again.

While we are, first and foremost, a cricket club, we are also a place to forge friendships, a place to engage and connect with schools, communities and cultures of local residents.

OUR MISSION

We want to be the best community cricket club in New Zealand and have a positive impact on our community's lives through cricket.

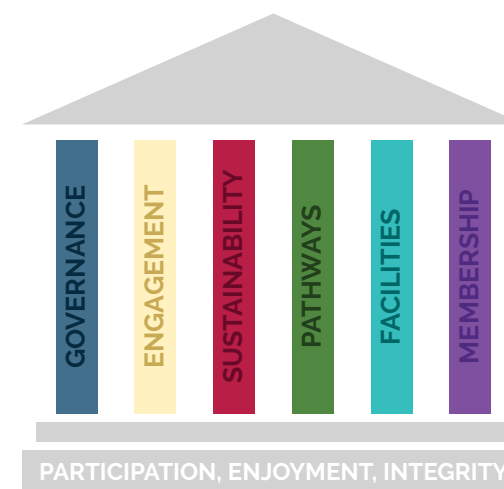
CORE VALUES

Our core values (participation, enjoyment, integrity) are the basis of our club identity and represents who we are and what is most important to us. We will only thrive as a club by focusing on delivering our strategic pillars, and living our core values.

STRATEGIC PILLARS

Our strategic pillars place an emphasis on sustainable growth, and place cricket, our members, and our community firmly at the centre of our decisions.

CLUB GOVERNANCE

We will achieve our club's vision with the right organisational and governance structures in place. Our leadership model must be robust and have high-quality administration and succession planning in every role. We will invest in the development of our committee to ensure we have the right skills, networks, and diversity in membership to enable BWCUCC to achieve our goals. Organisational risk will be mitigated through having the right policies, procedures and plans in place.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

By knowing who our stakeholders are (including our members, supporters, partners, and the wider community) and understanding their needs, we can better deliver to their requirements. With effective outreach, all existing and potential new stakeholders will know our value proposition and be more willing to partner with us. A constructive and focused partnership strategy will lead to new opportunities, better financial efficiencies, and the delivery of higher-quality cricket programmes.

FINANCIAL SUSTAINABILITY

Financial sustainability will be realised through adequate knowledge of potential income streams, and by reducing dependence on charitable donations. Strategic relations and evidenced-based forecasting will also contribute to the financial sustainability of our club. BWCUCC will implement financial systems and put people into roles that are focused on reducing costs and increasing income. Income streams will include increasing the use and utility of our facilities, as well as delivery of diversified services and cricket formats for our members.

CRICKET PATHWAYS

We will provide high-quality cricket and community sport-related pathways for our members (encompassing playing, coaching, administrative, and governance pathways). We will document our pathways to ensure they are transparent and equitable for all club members. Our pathways will be developed with the goals of providing a safe and positive environment and the opportunities for our members to fulfill their greatest potential. We will develop and align our pathways by partnering and engaging with external stakeholders and governing bodies.

CLUB BUILDINGS & FACILITIES

BWCUCC will develop and execute a facilities plan which caters to our needs, priorities, and balances our financial responsibilities. Our facilities will become a significant revenue contributor. The emphasis for our facilities plan will be to deliver safe, fit-for-purpose facilities that meet the needs of our members and community. Financially and culturally, the return on investment in our facilities will be maximised through being utilised by a variety of community groups. Our plans will deliver equity for our members.

MEMBERSHIP RETENTION

When we know our value to the community, we can work on the projects that will help us to attract and retain more members. We will continue to solicit the input of our members and community to develop plans for our facilities and cricketing offerings. We will continue to promote our story through a range of channels to attract new members and stay engaged with our community. We will foster a culture that supports our volunteers, with particular emphasis on inclusion, manaakitanga, diversity, and equity.

GOVERNANCE 2024/25

The executive committee is charged with setting the strategy, direction and policies for BWCUCC, and is ultimately responsible for the governance of the club.

Officers of the Club

BWCUCC has four Officers of the club: The chairman, treasurer, secretary, and patron who represent BWCUCC and the club at CMCA events and meetings. The chairman is also official delegate at CMCA Meetings. These positions are elected annually at Annual General Meetings.

Patron

Through the history of the club an honored senior member of the club has held the role of patron. Grant Dickson (#394) is a former member of the double-crown winning Premier side of 1990, BWCUCC Premier Centurion (125 Premier appearances), and still turns out regularly in President's grade as a classical top order batsman and occasional off-spin bowler. He has held the Office of Club Patron since 2015.

Executive Committee

Executive Committee members are elected at the club's Annual General Meeting, and vacancies that may arise during the year are filled by vote of the committee at our monthly committee meetings. The chairman, treasurer, and secretary are ex-officio committee members.

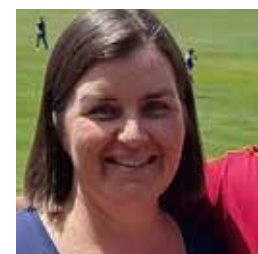

Burnside West-Christchurch University Cricket Club provides cricket opportunities for all ages, genders, and abilities—from social to competitive—by delivering age and stage appropriate player pathways aligned to New Zealand Cricket's 'Pathway to Performance' programme.



North West Women's Cricket is a subsidiary of BWCUCC, and was established in 2019 in an effort to develop the game and provide a more inclusive environment for female junior youth, and senior cricketers.



Our Boy's Youth programme—North West Youth Cricket (NWYC), is an MOU-based partnership with Merivale Papanui cricket (MPC), Burnside High School (BHS), and Papanui High School (PHS). The framework includes sharing training facilities, resources, and governance. NWYC provides encouragement for male high-school aged cricketers to stay in the sport as many schools in the North West zone do not deliver competitive Secondary School cricket. This affiliation to both BWCUCC and MPCC also provides a pathway back to senior cricket for players as they graduate high school.

TEAMS AND PARTICIPATION

In 2024/25, our club (including all Burnside West Christchurch University senior and junior members, North West Women's Junior, Youth, and Senior members, and North West Youth Boy's members) totaled nearly 540 playing members. We delivered cricket across a range of CMCA and CJCA interclub organisations, as well as grass-roots Smash Play and Kiwi cricket for our youngest members in a non-competitive skill builder format. Every Saturday, there were up to forty teams playing across a range of social and competitive cricket grades representing our club - all strongly supported from the sidelines by parents and loyal supporters and volunteers - scoring, umpiring, or managing teams.

BWCUC provides social, semi-competitive, and competitive club cricket to all ages, and is committed to providing pathways into Men's cricket for school leavers, as well as pathways to elite cricket for players wanting to make a career from our sport. We have a proud track record of success at all levels in the Christchurch Metropolitan Cricket Association competitions, and a large number of members who have gone on to play representative and international level.

Senior Club Captain's Report 2024/25

It has been a privilege to take over the role of Senior Club Captain this season, continuing the great work done by Will O'Brien in previous years. My first season on the Committee has been incredibly rewarding, and it is my pleasure to reflect on what has been another outstanding year for the club. I am deeply grateful for the support of our players, captains, supporters, and volunteers who have guided me in my first year and whose efforts are the reason this club continues to thrive.

On-Field Success:

Our morning grade teams continued their dominant run of form from recent seasons. The success across both top teams was exceptional: The Premiership team secured the two-day title for a third consecutive year—only the third time this has occurred in the competition's history. They also added to the trophy cabinet by taking out their first T20 title. The Championship side mirrored this success, impressively winning both their two-day and T20 competitions. Furthermore, the Division 2 Lions added more silverware to the cabinet by winning their one-day competition. In the afternoon grades, we once again saw strong participation and fielded a full suite of teams: Division 4 Tigers, Division 5 Broncos, Masters Robbie's, and Masters Foxes. A standout achievement this season was our club winning the Chairman's Cup, a mid-season competition composed of players from all men's teams outside of the Premiership side. Expertly led by James Guild-Inder, the winning squad featured members from all six eligible teams, showcasing the fantastic culture and unity that permeates all levels of our club.

Acknowledging Our Captains

A special thank you must be extended to the captains of our afternoon Men's grades for their flexibility and positive attitude throughout the season. As Christchurch's university club, we face the unique challenge of student player availability fluctuating during the year. The willingness of these captains to skillfully maneuver their squads and share players between teams was instrumental in ensuring we could consistently field full sides, particularly during leaner periods.

Social Cricket

Our social cricket scene continues to flourish, with the Duck Duck Sixes and the Sticky Wickets returning for another season in the Cavaliers grade. They have brought some excellent new members to our community, and it has been fantastic to witness them integrate so well into the wider club, increasing their presence in the clubrooms and getting involved in our events. I hope we will see them back for the 2025/26 season.

Player Achievements & Higher Honours

This season was also exceptional for individual player achievements, with 15+ members in total receiving higher honours.

The pinnacle of these achievements was Mitch Hay making his debut for the Blackcaps in both the One Day and T20 international formats. This brings our contingent in the current Blackcaps squad to three, with Mitch joining Tom Latham and Will O'Rourke, all of whom hold professional contracts.

On the domestic front, we congratulate two players on receiving their first professional contracts for the upcoming 2025/26 season: Scott Janett with Canterbury and Oscar Jackson with Wellington. The success of these individuals shows Burnside's continued ability to develop players from the junior club right through to the professional level and is a clear indicator of our club's strength.

I look forward to the 2025/26 season with great anticipation. Together, we will continue to build on our positive culture and strive for success on and off the pitch at all levels. I am excited to work with everyone to continue on our strong path.

This season also saw the successful introduction of player-purchased, numbered uniforms. The feedback on this new system and the modern shirt design has been overwhelmingly positive.

YOUTH BOY'S CRICKET

North West Youth 1st XI

Term one was a resounding success for the NWYC 1st XI, who went through nine games unbeaten to win the Cup section and secure qualification for the Championship round in Term 4. The team started the Championship round strongly with a great win over St Bede's, followed by an even better result against St Andrew's. This placed critical importance on the next match against a struggling Sydenham side; a win would have guaranteed a top-four finish and a place in the 2025 Championship round. Unfortunately, the weather intervened, and the crucial game was cancelled. A subsequent loss to a strong CBHS 1st XI meant the team narrowly missed top-four contention. The final four games of the year yielded only one win but produced a memorable highlight, with Jasper Welford scoring a superb 104 against CBHS 2nd XI. The team now looks ahead to Term 1 2025, determined to defend their Cup title.

North West Youth 2nd XI

After finishing third in the Plate competition in Term 1, the NWYC 2nd XI earned a promotion to the Bowl competition for Term 4. The first game was an exciting draw against Shirley Boys', with NWYC snatching the final wicket just as their opponents looked poised to hit the winning run. The team registered two convincing wins against Sydenham and St Andrew's, featuring excellent batting displays. North West Youth Year 9/10 Summary

With lower player numbers in 2024, NWYC fielded one Colts team and two Year 9 teams. The Colts struggled in Term 4 after losing key players, including their wicketkeeper, and finished the season at the bottom of the ladder. Captained by Zac Chalmers, the team continued to develop their skills and tactical understanding in preparation for their move into senior youth cricket in 2025. The Year 9A team was challenged throughout the season, finishing with more losses than wins despite some notable individual successes. NWYC also fielded two other Year 9 teams, who had successful seasons, finishing 3rd and 4th in the Year 9B competition.

PLAYHQ REGISTRATION, E-SCORING, & STATISTICS

Player Registration

In 2022, NZC adopted the PlayHQ electronic player registration and match scoring system. This NZ wide platform was used for player registrations for all community cricket - junior, youth, and senior - all over New Zealand.

The PlayHQ platform was originally developed as a registration database and scoring platform in Australia for other sports (including field hockey), and at the time of release, the cricket-specific capabilities of the platform were quite under-developed. However since 2022, significant gains have been made, making PlayHQ a reliable scoring platform on game-days.

Despite technology drawbacks compared to the prior CricHQ system, and simplicity shortcomings compared to traditional pen and paper, the PlayHQ platform is slowly gaining popularity,

PlayHQ was adequate as a registration platform, enabling online payment and relatively simple setup. All playing members were required to use the platform in order to have their names available for selection in team lists for electronic scoring.

In total, the club (across BWC, NWW, and NWWY) PlayHQ recorded membership 278 active members for the 2024/25 summer (including players, coaches, and managers).

E-Scoring

The PlayHQ platform supports live scoring in a web browser, with similar features to the app-based platform that it replaced (CricHQ).

In 2024/25 the majority of morning grade matches were live scored allowing club members and supported to follow-on live on their phones, from around the city or the world. It is hoped that in 2024/25 that improvements to the platform will make it easier still.

The club invested in streaming service nvPlay in 2024/25 that allowed matches to be streamed over the internet, which was very popular for supporters who could not be at the ground for BWCUCC and NWWC Premiership teams.

In 2025/26 all teams will be supplied with an iPad to enable live online scoring, thanks to a generous donation of secondhand devices from Christchurch City Council.

Team & Individual Statistics

The mixed use of electronic and paper score books, especially in afternoon grades in 2024/25, made the capture of statistics challenging

Officially, individual and grade statistics are available for all club members at the NZC links below, however, it has been pointed out that many records are inaccurate or unreliable. Unfortunately this issue which was raised last year is still not fully addressed.

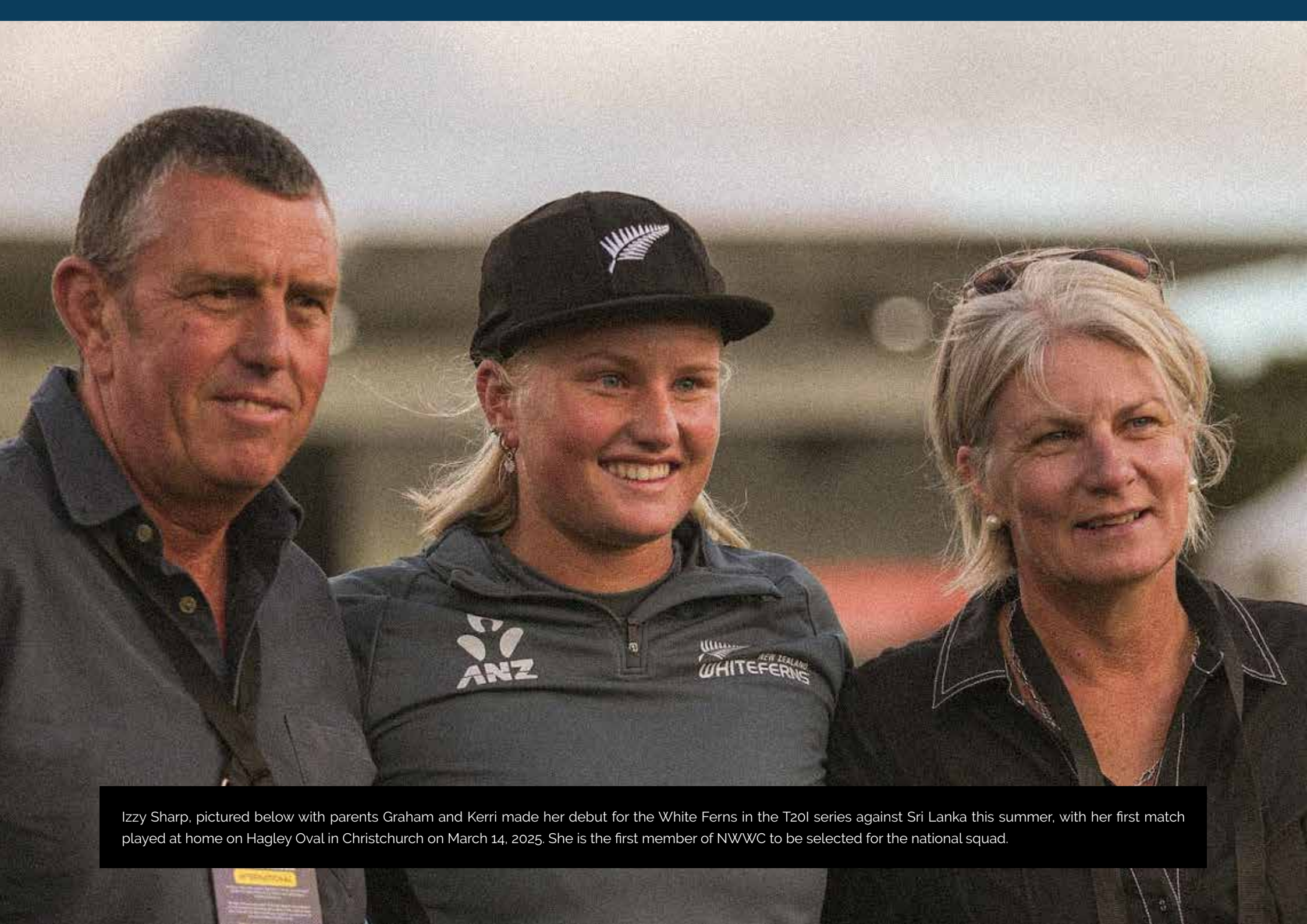

Premier Men's 2025/26 Season Report

The 2025/26 season was another dominant one for our Premier Men. With most of the previous season's squad retained, sights were set high on securing more silverware.

Two-Day Competition

The first block of red-ball cricket began strongly, featuring two large wins over St Albans and Sydenham, alongside weather-affected draws against Riccarton and Heathcote. The most notable individual performance from the first part of our campaign was Oscar Jackson's magnificent 143* against Riccarton.

The post-Christmas phase of red-ball matches got off to a rocky start. After losing the toss to Lancaster Park at their temporary St Albans Park home, our Prens were reeling at 30/8. However, an impressive counter-attacking 57 from Tom Turner enabled us to post a total of 117. In reply, LPCC were bowled out for 168,

with Matt Hay claiming an outstanding 6/31. In the second innings, our Premiers showed immense resolve, batting for 91 overs in tough conditions to escape with a draw—a pivotal moment in the competition.

Round six saw an impressive first innings and a huge 202-run win over East Shirley. The match was highlighted by several incredible performances: Henry Christie scored his maiden Premier hundred, while Matt Hay (92) and Oscar Jackson (70)* put on a blistering 139-run partnership in just nine overs. To top it off, Alex Tait returned the remarkable match figures of 8 for 10 from 23.2 overs, which included 16 maidens.

This win gave the Premiers a commanding lead heading into the final round. Although the side narrowly lost by six runs to OBC in the final game, we had already done enough to secure the championship and complete the three-peat.

T20 Competition

A new initiative from the CMCA to host the T20 finals day at Hagley Oval placed a huge prize on this competition—playing under lights at an international venue is something that many club players will only experience once or twice in their careers. We finished the round-robin stage in third place, booking a semi-final dance with Sydenham. We received a massive boost with the availability of newly minted BLACKCAPS T20 wicket-keeper Mitchell Hay for finals day.

In the semi-final, we set a formidable 181, thanks to half-centuries from Scott Janett and Henry Christie and a rapid 46 from Mitch Hay. In response, Sydenham could only muster 136, with Jackson Latham (3/17) the pick of the bowlers.

As promised, the final against OBC was played under lights, a huge thrill for the players. An impressive bowling and fielding performance restricted OBC to just 104 runs. Latham (3/20), Alex Tait (3/22), Matt Hay (2/17), and Adam Winter (2/8) were all outstanding. The chase was anchored by a classy 50 from Scott Janett, as the Prens coasted to their first-ever T20 title with 37 balls and seven wickets to spare.

One-Day Competition

The one-day competition began in January, and the Prems carried on their strong form from the early season two day format, winning four of their six matches to finish third and set up another semi-final against OBC. In a precarious position at 113/7, Adam Winter and Alex Tait put on a crucial 60-run partnership for the eighth wicket. Winter then dominated with the tail, finishing on a magnificent 81* to lift the team to a competitive 239/9. OBC was dismissed for 181 in reply, with Winter's 4/30 capping off a stellar all-round performance.

The final at St Albans Park was delayed by rain. In challenging conditions, our Prems set a target of 176 from 42 overs, with Nick Gibb (39) and Adam Winter (36)* as the main contributors. Unfortunately, Lancaster Park managed to chase the score down seven wickets down. Notable performances from the one-day campaign included Nick Gibb's 130* against St Albans and Alex Tait's 5/28 against Riccarton.

Two-Day Competition

We started with a formidable statement win against St Albans Sabres, proving that even with exams looming, the lads could focus on what was truly important: cricket. The team amassed a commanding 9 declared for 236, before the bowling unit dismissed St Albans for 108 and 96 to secure a dominant outright victory. Four wins from 6 matches gave us the top spot, heading into the final round, and despite an out-right loss to OBC in the final weekend, we had done enough to take home the trophy, and to claim back-to-back silverware.

T20 Competition

The T20 campaign was undoubtedly the highlight of the season. The format suits the team's aggressive style, and short attention spans, leading to a sweep of the preliminary rounds with comprehensive victories, including a 9-wicket demolition of OBC and a high-scoring 58-run win over St Albans after posting an imposing 215.

This momentum carried into a blockbuster semi-final against Heathcote 2nd XI. Batting first, Burnside set a competitive total of 9 for 141. What followed was a ruthless display with the ball. The bowling attack dismantled the Heathcote batting lineup, skittling them for just 63, booking a well-deserved place in the final. The Final was played against Halswell CC on Hagley Oval as the curtain raiser to

the Premier Final the same day. We scored a very imposing 165/6 and rolled the Vikings for 73 to comfortably take out the grade.

One-Day Competition

The One-Day competition was a journey of tight contests and near misses. The team was competitive in every match winning 5 of 7 in the round-robin. This fighting spirit us them to a home semi-final against a strong St Albans side. In a match worthy of a final, the Burnside batting unit produced an excellent performance, posting a very strong total of 8 for 266. Defending the total, the bowlers toiled with heart and skill, taking the game deep. In a tense conclusion, St Albans managed to chase the target with just one ball to spare, ending Burnside's campaign with a narrow 4-wicket loss.

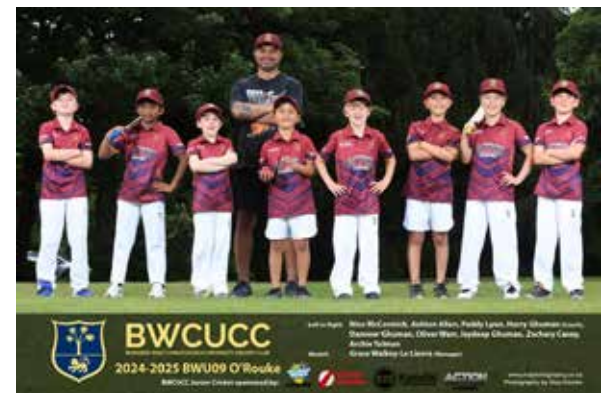

TREASURER'S REPORT

It is with great pleasure that I report the club has finished the last financial year in a strong position, recording a modest surplus of just under \$5,000. This is an excellent result and a testament to our careful financial management, especially given the challenging environment for community sports clubs.

Our income

Our financial health is built on a diverse range of income streams. While grant funding remains highly competitive, we were successful in securing \$77,000, which accounted for approximately 31% of our total income. This funding is vital, directly contributing to player apparel, playing equipment, and high-quality coaching.

We were also delighted to see an increase in contributions from our sponsorship partners. This, combined with an uplift in community donations and fundraising efforts, has been crucial. These varied sources of income are fundamental to our long-term sustainability and highlight the importance of nurturing our strong relationships with sponsors, gaming trusts, and the wider community.

Managing our expenses

We have continued our practice of diligent expense management. Key investments were directed towards areas that most benefit our members: coaching to develop player skills, ground preparation to ensure our facilities remain top-notch, and the provision of necessary playing equipment and clothing. Meanwhile, operational costs like administration and utilities were carefully controlled to ensure the club runs smoothly and efficiently.

A significant area to note is the rising cost of paid services. These costs increased by another 5% this year and now represent over \$100,000 (or 40%) of our total income. This trend reflects a long-term decline in volunteer availability, requiring us to pay for services that were once donated. This area presents our single biggest opportunity to reduce expenses, which would free up significant funds for other club priorities.

GEORGE JAMES HOWDEN ESTATE

George James Howden, a Life Member and long-time supporter of Burnside West-Christchurch University Cricket Club, died in 2007. In his Will he left the Club a generous bequest of \$20,000.

He also instructed Trustees Executors Ltd to set up a Deed of Arrangement to utilise the "residual" funds from his Estate, and invest them to provide a long-term income stream for our Club. The Estate was registered as a charitable entity by the Charities Commission on 30 June 2008.

The Club at all times needs to be aware that the initial bequest and all subsequent income generated under the Deed may only be utilised by the Club for the following purposes: (a) The provision of coaching services at all grades; (b) the maintenance, upkeep and improvement of the grounds upon which the Club's activities are centred or take place; (c) the provision of or improvement to the facilities and amenities of the Club, and (d) the general betterment of the Club as a whole, and the promotion of its interests.

To ensure the income is paid or applied in accordance with the terms of the Trust, it is a requirement that at all times there is an Advisory Committee of three persons who must give prior approval. Upon the death, retirement, resignation, or removal from the office of any Advisory Committee member, the remaining two members will appoint another suitable person to fill the vacancy. The Advisory Committee shall make such rules and regulations to govern its functioning as it may determine and any such rules or regulations may from time to time be revoked, amended, replaced or modified with the unanimous approval of all Advisory Committee Members.

The current Advisory Committee office holders are Grant Dickson, Paul O'Flaherty, and Christopher Kennedy. In conjunction with the Trustees Executors, they have continued the "conservative growth portfolio" strategy established by the original Advisory Committee and Trustee Executors. At each balance date, annual accounts are prepared by the Trustees Executors, and once approved by the Advisory Committee the net income shall be paid to the Club by Trustees Executors Ltd after setting aside an agreed percentage to add to the Trust Capital.

The Kiwi Gaming Foundation are perennial supporters of our club. Their funds are mostly used to contribute towards the costs of providing high quality cricket pitches at our club. Burnside Park hosts four top grass quality cricket blocks, as well as a dedicated grass practice block, which is used by our junior, youth, and adult members. We are our proud to have some of the finest playing and training surfaces in New Zealand.
